PHOENIX SPORTS V EPSOM & EWELL

Keith McMahon's new look Phoenix Sports host an F.A. Cup replay when Epsom and Ewell visit the Christopher Russell Stadium, Barnehurst on Tuesday evening.

On Saturday, Isthmian League South East Division Phoenix travelled to Surrey for their Extra Preliminary Round tie and chances were few and far between with the hosts goalkeeper Fabien Witter making the only real save of the goal-less match.

During the summer, McMahon has been busy recruiting an entirely new squad so all made their Phoenix debuts at Epsom, who ply their trade in the Combined Counties Football League.

One newcomer who may be recognisable to home fans is Alex Gaggin who played for the Sports in 2020. He has since played for McMahon at both VCD Athletic and Whitstable Town.

Other Phoenix players who may be known to North West Kent / South East London clubs' supporters include Alfie Bloomfield, who represented Beckenham Town last season, and Noah Joyce, who spent a month on loan from Bromley to Erith and Belvedere prior to his departure from the Ravens in the summer.

The winners of the replay have a home tie awaiting them in the Preliminary Round with Hayes & Yeading United awaiting the outcome.

THE UNTOLD GAME 73 DAYS OF SUMMER

Football has had a rocky history in North America. Despite some initial success in the 1920s and a boost in popularity from exceptional European teams who were paid to tour the New World, it has been difficult for the world's most popular sport to gain a foothold in a land where native sports - Gridiron Football, Ice Hockey and Baseball - reign supreme. That has not prevented some ambitious people from trying to grow the game though, and with the growth of the MLS and the recent formation of the Canadian Soccer League, maybe they have finally found a way to make their game sustainable. A word that was disastrously untrue of the Canadian Professional Soccer League of 1983.

In some ways, it's easy to see why Canada's football authorities saw 1983 as the ideal time to start a league. The 1982 World Cup had brought new fans to the game, and the North American Soccer League (a forerunner to the MLS) was entering its fifth season, apparently showing that the game could indeed survive and thrive in North America. There were Canadian teams in the NASL; The Calgary Boomers, the Edmonton Drillers, and the Vancouver Whitecaps, who had European stars like Alan Ball and Ruud Krol playing for them, along with exciting youngsters Bruce Grobbelar and Peter Beardsley. But Canadian fans struggled to travel the distance to see their team play in San Jose, Los Angeles or Houston, and those long journeys caused significant financial distress to the NASL's Canadian teams. The CPSL would apparently solve that problem, bringing football north of the border in the first fully national competition.

Unfortunately, and seemingly a surprise to the Canadian Soccer Association, Canada itself is the size of a continent, even when you exclude the United States. In an effort to keeps costs low, the CSA required only a \$50,000 fee for owners to enter a team into the new competition (vastly reduced from the NASL requirement), and budget caps were introduced. Each squad would be limited to just 16 players, with a maximum of five internationals. The league would run with FIFA's rules, unlike the NASL which had attempted to generate more interest with American-style rules that they thought made for a better spectacle. Despite this, attendances would remain low throughout the competition.

The original plan had been to hold the league in two groups - and eastern and a western conference - with finals between each group's champions. But initially only five teams were interested in joining the league; Edmonton Eagles, Hamilton Steelers, Mississauga Croatia, Toronto Nationals and FC Inter-Montreal. A sixth team from Kitchener pulled out, but were replaced before the season started by the Calgary Mustangs. The league was reformatted into one, single, nationwide group.

In the weeks before the season started, owner of the NASL's Montreal Manic announced that he was going to turn his team into Team Canada, presumably as a means to head off the threat posed by the CPSL. This was an unexpected blow, and the Canadian Soccer Association turned its attention to this new Team Canada, allowing the CPSL to flounder before it had even begun. Regardless, the season kicked off. It was a disaster.

On 21st May, the first game of the new league saw the Toronto Nationals defeat FC Inter-Montreal 2-1, but in front of just 3000 supporters. Weeks later, ignoring his league commitments, the Toronto owner entered his team into a friendly tournament with Marseille, Udinese and Avellino. The Europeans also played Hamilton and Mississauga on their tour of the country, disrupting the CPSL. Despite these revenues, on 20th June, less than a month after the start of the new season, Toronto folded. Montreal did the same on the very same day. A month into the first ever season, the CPSL had lost a third of its clubs.

Within weeks, with just four teams, it was decided to cancel the season and advance directly to the playoffs, which had a four-team format anyway. Edmonton saw off Calgary in the semi-finals, where they were met by Hamilton. The Eagles won the Championship game 2-0, and took the first and only Canadian title back to Edmonton. The league announced it's closing the very next day. The successful NASL would last only one more season, folding in 1984.

It has been 40 years since that experiment, and North American football is still struggling to find its feet. While the MLS feels finally to have stabilised, helped by the arrival of Beckham, Zlatan and Messi, the new Canadian league is much younger, having been founded in only 2019. Of the finalists from the CPSL, the new Edmonton franchise folded in 2022, but Hamilton (now Forge, not Steelers) have won four of the five Canadian Premier League titles. It's not as flashy as its southern counterpart, it's not as rich as its European rivals, but maybe, this time, Canadian football can survive.

Founded in 1935 as St. Johns Welling, later Lakeside, the club was renamed Phoenix post-WWII, symbolizing a rise from the ashes after the blitz. Initially, they played at various local venues before settling at Mayplace Road East, Bexleyheath in 1950, where both football and cricket were played, though cricket has since moved.

Phoenix competed in the Sidcup, Kent Amateur, and Dartford Leagues before settling in the Kent County League Division One West. They joined the Spartan League in 1986, then returned to the Kent County League, winning the Challenge Cup in 1993-94. Promotion to the Premier Division came in 1999/2000, followed by relegations and a return to the Premier Division by 2007/08.

In 2011, management changes led to the appointment of Steve O'Boyle and Tony Beckingham. The club installed floodlights and seating, achieving an F Grade. Phoenix then won the Kent Invicta League, securing promotion to the Kent League (now Southern Counties East Football League). They finished sixth in their first season and had a notable FA Vase run.

Phoenix earned promotion to the Isthmian League North Division after a strong league performance. They finished 14th initially, then improved to 8th. A lateral move placed them in the Isthmian League South for 2017-18, finishing 11th, then 9th the following season. The COVID-19 pandemic disrupted the 2019/20 and 2020/21 seasons.

In 2021/22, Phoenix were relegated to the SCEFL but bounced back with a playoff win under O'Boyle, securing promotion at VCD Athletic thanks to a last minute Ryan Hayes penalty.

O'Boyle led the team to a safe finish in 2023/24 before Keith McMahon took over for another season at Step 4.

Epsom Juniors Cricket Club, founded in March 1918, transitioned to Epsom Juniors F.C. that autumn and entered competitive football in 1919 with the Surrey Junior League. Rebranded as Epsom Town F.C. in 1922, the club enjoyed early success, winning multiple trophies and moving up to Intermediate and then Senior football.

The club relocated to West Street in 1925, achieving significant success, including winning the London League in 1927/28. Despite a strong 1930s era, including a notable FA Cup run, World War II caused a temporary suspension.

Post-war, Epsom F.C. returned to competitive play and joined the Corinthian League in 1949, achieving varied success through the 1950s and '60s. Renamed Epsom & Ewell F.C. in 1960, the club faced challenges, including relegations, but also won the Surrey Senior Shield and had notable cup runs. The 1970s saw resurgence with league and cup victories, and in 1977, they joined the Isthmian League, achieving promotion to Division One.

The club experienced fluctuations in performance and management changes through the 1980s and '90s. In 1993, Epsom left West Street, sharing grounds with Banstead Athletic and later others, and faced mixed results. The 2000s brought managerial changes and league transitions, culminating in a notable FA Vase run in 2009/10.

After multiple relocations, the club settled at Cobham F.C. in 2023/24 and appointed new management, aiming for stability but the 2024/25 season saw the club move again, this time to King George's Fields, the home of Corinthian Casuals F.C. Warren Burton continued as manager alongside coach Glynn Berry.

Meanwhile, the search continues for a new ground back in the Borough...

TENON-LEAGUE

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THERE'S nothing quite like the FA Cup to spark debate among football fans.

Whether it's kick-off time on FA Cup final day - incidentally this year's is 3pm - or clamours for a return to semi-finals away from Wembley, the world's oldest competition always stirs debate.

You will have no doubt seen the furore around the news replays will be scrapped from the first round proper onwards next season.

A big trigger, apparently, is the expanding UEFA schedule going forward and there are promises of more funding for the grass-roots game.

A post on BBC Sport's X account suggested it would divide opinion - the reality was a large part of it fell on one side.

There probably isn't enough space in this programme column to go through all the 'he saids, she saids', and much more. But it has ignited passionate views from all corners of the game, to say the least. What's your view? Are replays outdated or the very fabric of the great FA Cup?

For many in the lower leagues and Non-League, replays not only represent a chance to make extra money on top of a current cup run through gates and potential broadcast fees, they are also an opportunity to create memories.

Many clubs have come out and said exactly that over this past week.

Steve McKimm's Cray Valley PM held Charlton Athletic to a draw earlier this season and earned the right to welcome the League One club to their intimate Artic Stadium home in front of the live TV cameras. "The money they're saying will be passed down is great - but money doesn't make memories," McKimm told us. "We've had memories this season that will never be taken away from our staff, players and fans. And I only speak for our club - Horsham did the same.

"We both had away games to start with so we had the experience of playing at their grounds. Then we had the opportunity to bring good players, good teams, back to our home ground on live TV. That's gone now.

"But it's the memories that matter more than the money. For clubs that make money off it, such as us, it's great. It helps a club be sustainable and it helps it move on. But it also gives the club memories.

"Cray Valley have never had a League One side come and play a competitive game at our stadium. We've done that now."

As the Millers boss says, Horsham did the same in this year's competition - earning a replay after a thrilling 3-3 draw with Barnsley before a memorable home tie with the Tykes.

There are many other examples. Think back down the years to Burton Albion, then in the Conference, taking the mighty Manchester United to a second game. The tangible legacy is seen at the club today, but for fans and players the memories burn bright too.

Football, as a whole, should be sure it's happy giving moments like those up.


