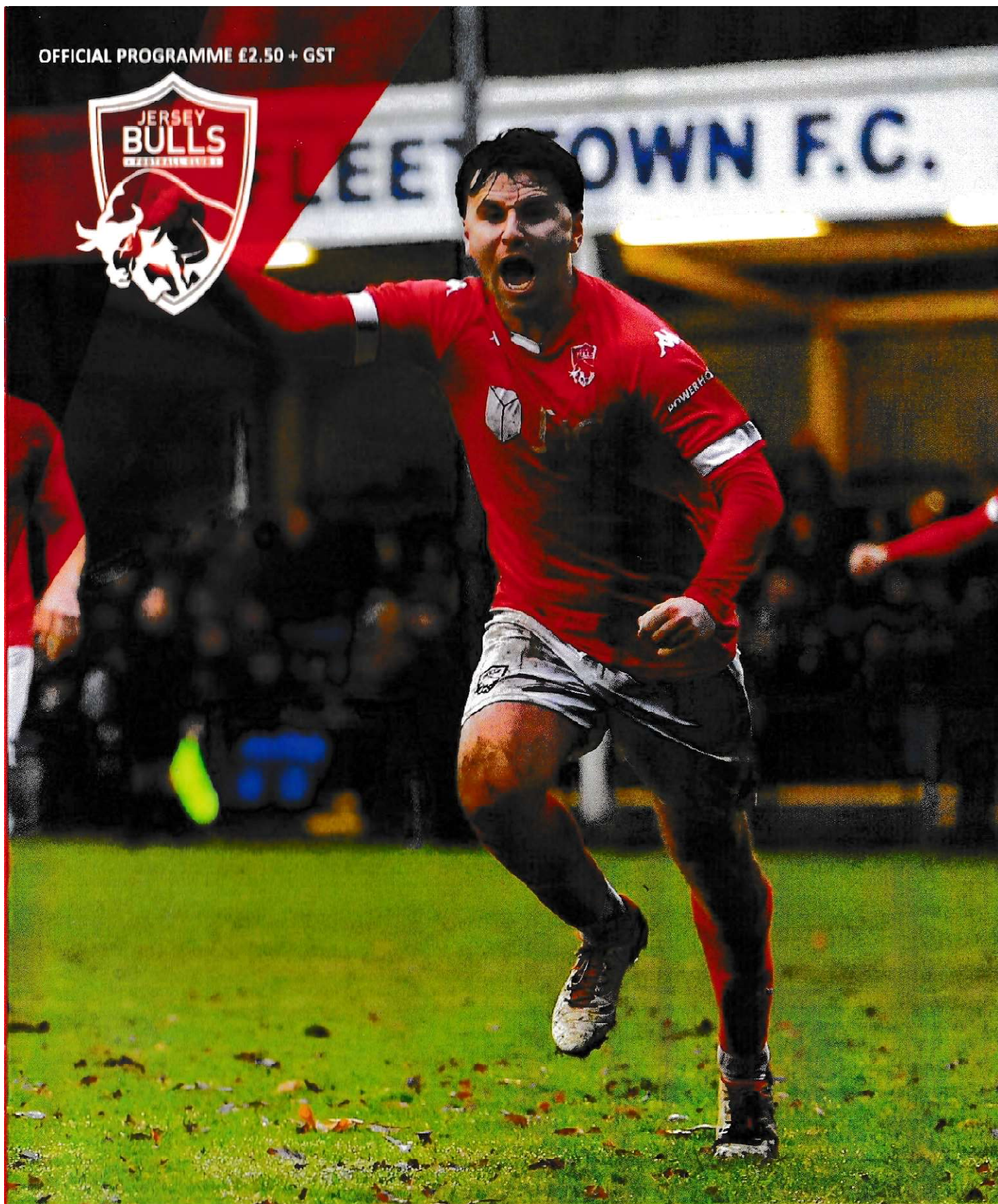

The club were originally founded in March 1918 as Epsom Juniors Cricket Club and played cricket throughout the summer. In the autumn, Epsom Juniors FC came into being and played a handful of games from what is now known as Alexandra Recreation Ground. Competitive football followed and they entered the Surrey Junior League in 1919 and became founder members of the Sutton & District League in 1920. A change of name in July 1922, to Epsom Town FC, heralded the start of a very successful era. In September 1925, the club relocated to the old Ewell FC ground at West Street, which was purchased through the generosity of their future president, Robert Bradshaw. In 1925/26, the championship of the Surrey Senior League was attained and the following season they defeated Egham 1-0, at Egham, in the League Charity Cup, to complete a league and cup 'double'. Election to the London League followed, and the title was claimed in the first attempt in 1927/28. In 1929, Redhill beat Epsom 3-2, in front of 4,600 at Guildford, in their first Surrey Senior Cup Final. The Thirties were a very successful era and they won the Surrey Charity Senior Shield in 1933 with an impressive 5-0 win over Woking at Kingfield. However, the proudest moment of their pre-war history was an appearance in the First Round proper of the FA Cup in 1933/34. A crowd of 9,485 at the Lea Bridge Speedway Stadium witnessed a 4-2 loss against the hosts Clapton Orient. At the end of that season, the club changed its name to Epsom FC.

In 1949, they entered the Corinthian League and, in 1952, reached the League Memorial Shield Final, going down 2-1 to champions Hounslow at Eastbourne, after leading at halftime. In 1954, they reached the Surrey Senior Cup final for the second time, losing unluckily 2-0 to Corinthian-Casuals in front of 6,159 at Selhurst Park. In 1960, the club changed its name once again to Epsom & Ewell FC. In 1963 the Corinthian League merged with the Athenian and Delphian leagues and the club were placed in Division One of the new structure. The Sixties were full of poor results, with relegation in 1965. Further relegations were avoided in the early seventies by the benefit of re-election. However, in 1973, despite 'improving' to finish second from bottom, the Athenian League ran out of patience.

A move to the Surrey Senior League led to the winning of the League Cup and, the following season, in 1974/75, the club achieved a second Surrey Senior League 'double'. That season will always be remembered, however, for the club reaching the final of the inaugural FA Vase, where 9,500 saw the Blues edged out 2-1 by Hoddesdon Town at Wembley Stadium. Two of the club's players that season, Trevor Lee and Phil Walker, further achieved transfers to league outfit Millwall FC.

An invitation then followed to join the expanding Isthmian League for 1977/78 and Epsom were placed in the new Division Two and the title was clinched the following April, securing a move to Division One. In 1983/84, a spot in the Premier Division was achieved as runners-up. They survived comfortably in their first season in the Isthmian Premier but the manager's departure to Croydon, in 1985, started a decline. Relegation followed in 1986, and also in 1987. In 1993, a large chapter in the club's history ended as they left West Street and moved in as tenants of Banstead Athletic FC. The decade was largely one of frustration, although they did reach the final of the Associate Members Trophy in 1998, losing 2-0 to Bedford Town at Hendon's old Claremont Road ground.

In 2002, promotion was achieved to the newly created Division One South, where a 9th place finish was achieved. However, relegation followed a year later. In 2006, the club transferred into the Combined Counties League Premier Division. In April of 2010, they terminated their seventeen-year ground-sharing agreement with Banstead Athletic, and spent two unspectacular seasons at Merstham FC before relocating to High Road, home of Chipstead FC, for the 2012/13 season, where they would spend eight seasons. The season brought significant playing success as a slow start was followed by a spectacular run of form, including a club record of 12 straight league wins, before a tricky run-in resulted in a final position of fifth. However, any disappointment there was tempered by the club's first silverware since 1981 when they defeated South Park 3-0 at Farnborough to win the Combined Counties League Cup.

They carried their form into 2013/14, and led the league with eight straight wins, but couldn't hold on and had to settle for third place, the highest league finish since 1984. In 2016/17, they started the season with an incredible 9-2 win at newly promoted Bedfont, despite trailing 2-0 at half-time, and went on to a fourth-place finish in the League. In addition, they reached the league cup final but were defeated 4-1 by Westfield at Windsor FC. The 2017/18 season saw Epsom & Ewell finish second-from-bottom of the Premier Division, resulting in relegation to Division One. At the end of the 2020/21 season, the club were transferred to Division One of the Southern Combination League. In 2022/23, they were runners-up in Division One, qualifying for the promotion play-offs. After defeating Selsey FC 6-5 on penalties in the semi-finals (after a 0-0 draw), they beat Wick 2-1 in the final, earning promotion to the Premier Division South of the Combined Counties League, where they remain today.

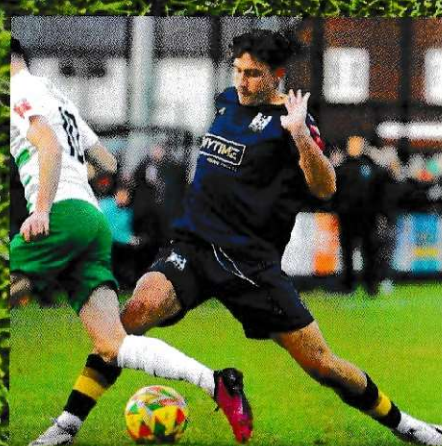

The Lost Irish Superstar

The Munich Air Disaster is a watershed moment in the history of English football. It saw the loss of a golden generation of talent, much of which had, or was expected to, make an impact on the national stage. Matt Busby's 'babes' had to be rebuilt almost from scratch, taking almost a decade to win the European Cup he was so desperate for, with survivor Bobby Charlton at the heart of the new team. But, alongside the seven English victims of the tragedy, was a solitary non-English body. And Irish international Billy Whelan might just have become that nation's best ever player.

Whelan was born in 1935 in Dublin and, after losing his father aged only eight, he showed little serious interest in becoming a footballer. The priesthood called to him and would have been a far more appropriate profession for him to take up in Ireland in the 1940s and 1950s. His brothers had an influence though, with eldest brother Christy playing for Transport and middle brother John playing for Shamrock Rovers. As a teenager, Whelan joined Home Farm but it was not long before he joined Busby's revolution at Manchester United. When discovering that they had made him an offer, Christy remarked 'it's about bloody time.'

A quiet 18-year old, Whelan started his career in United's reserves, making his debut in the FA Youth Cup final and embarking on a tour of Switzerland. His ability saw envious glances from clubs across Europe and those in South America (where the lack of a wage cap was seeing something of a revolution) enquired about his availability. But Busby was also impressed with Whelan's deft touch and a physicality that belied his age. He fast tracked him into the first team, at a time when that just did not really happen. 'If you're good enough, you're old enough.'

An inside left, he made his senior United debut in 1955, performing well enough to keep his place amongst more senior professionals. In his second season, the would-be priest started to click with his new teammates, something fans in Manchester already thought had happened, and fired in a return of 33 goals in 56 appearances. At the age of just 20, the Irishman had the world at his feet and the weight of his nation on his shoulders. He was going to change footballing history.

Busby was a man possessed. He had rebuilt Manchester United after the war in his own image, dispensing with wisdom about old players and trusting in youth. They were physical enough when they needed to be, but mesmerising with the ball at their feet. He was convinced they could take on the best in the world and had already conquered English football. But, by the start of the 1957-58 season, he had watched a Real Madrid side of

Alfredo di Stefano, Ferenc Puskas and Raymond Kopa win the first two European Cups and he wanted a piece of that action. Manchester United, he believed, should be competing with the European elite, not just beating the domestic elite.

That season, the draw saw United take on Shamrock Rovers, a special game for Whelan. He had won four caps for his nation but still felt he did not have the trust of national manager Johnny Carey, who would be in attendance. He had also received criticism at home for abandoning the League of Ireland, so this would be a chance to show them exactly why.

In cold and blustery conditions in Ireland, Shamrock gave everything to compete with the exciting young side Busby had put together, but to no avail. Despite holding the English champions for most of the first half, Tommy Taylor broke the deadlock just before half time. In the second half, the visitors ran riot, with Whelan scoring two of the five additional goals United added. It was a personal success for him, but it was a high point. He was informed that his mother was unwell, and his form dipped. A young Charlton took his place in the starting XI.

There was no question of his ability at Old Trafford and he was expected to be back to his best in no time. He asked to be excused from travel to Yugoslavia for the quarter-final because he wasn't expected to play and wanted to visit home. But Busby wanted him to fly to be available in case of an injury.

What happened on the night of 6th February 1958 requires no explanation. The icy runway, the loss of so much life, the memorial every February suffice. The headlines, in England at least, went to Duncan Edwards, the jewel at the heart of the Busby Babes, who fought for his life for two weeks before finally succumbing to his injuries. But Ireland lost a star that night too.

Never a confident flyer, as the plane started to attempt it's take off in Munich, Whelan is said to have remarked 'this may be death, but I'm ready.' It was tragically prophetic.

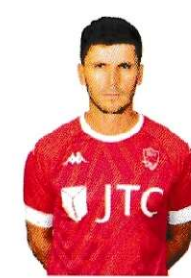

Fleet Town 1-4 Jersey Bulls - MATCH REPORT

28th December - Mustard Seed Stadium - Attendance: 552

Combined Counties Premier Division South

Jersey travelled for the third of their away games against their main rivals. All four have still to be met at home. Fleet Town lay 5th with just one league defeat in the 20 played so far. Their record of 13-6-1 40-17 looks likely to gain them a play-off spot. They are also in the last 32 of the FA Vase after winning through four rounds and they are still in the Aldershot Senior Cup too. Jersey made one change to their starting XI with Harry Curtis coming into the back four which allowed Jonny Le Quesne to move to the right of midfield, replacing Fraser Barlow. Barlow was on the bench alongside Seaney McColgan, Kieran Lester and notionally the injured Jay Giles who was also acting as 'sponge man'.

A cagey opening, on a wet pitch, initially saw little goalmouth action. Jersey were doing the pressing and Rai Dos Santos was deemed narrowly offside on a couple of occasions after breaking through the Fleet defence. Toby Ritzema scuffed a volley and Dos Santos flashed the ball across the face of the goal from a narrow angle. After half an hour Francis Lekimamati took a knock and hobbled off to be replaced by Barlow. Within a minute he played in Dos Santos whose shot was saved by Finley Purcell's legs. The game then came to life as five minutes later Le Quesne missed an open goal after a left wing cross from Dos Santos found him unmarked eight yards out. A similar move just before the break saw Dos Santos rectify the situation when he finished off a Barlow cross from close in to give Jersey the lead. Jersey almost has a second but captain Liam Pestle threw himself in front of a Ritzema shot. There were numerous loud appeals for a penalty but it was not clear cut enough for the referee. Fleet launched a clearance up the right flank where James Carr missed the ball destined for Fareed Hakeem-Habeeb and the winger advanced to the byline before cutting the ball back. Tane Caubo swiftly switched feet and rifled the ball in to the roof of the net as Euan Van der Vliet advanced. A frustrated Ritzema was sin binned for his protests as the interval arrived with the teams now level.

When Ritzema returned Jersey immediately took a stranglehold on the game with two goals in four minutes, both scored by substitute Barlow. The first of them arrived when Dos Santos swung in a free kick thirty yards out on the left towards the far post. Defender Josh Stepney met it with a diving header but only managed to put it back across the goal where Barlow fastened on to it and hit a cross shot into the bottom right corner as Purcell tried vainly to reach him. The harrying of defenders paid off for the third goal as Joe Kilshaw robbed Rob Sheridan and Dos Santos held off Stepney as they battled for the loose ball. He fed Barlow in space to his left and his shot from fifteen

yards nutmegged Tom Smith and his cross shot found the same spot as he had four minutes before. Fleet brought on their attacking substitutions as they attempted to recover the situation but Jersey made the game safe with just over quarter of an hour to go. Carr redeemed his earlier error as he advanced down the left channel and switched the play with an incisive pass to Le Quesne to his right. Le Quesne's strong shot was charged down but the rebound fell to Kilshaw whose shot might have lacked Le Quesne's power but had the direction required for the fourth goal. Jersey might have had a fifth in the dying embers but substitute Kieran Lester shot at Purcell.

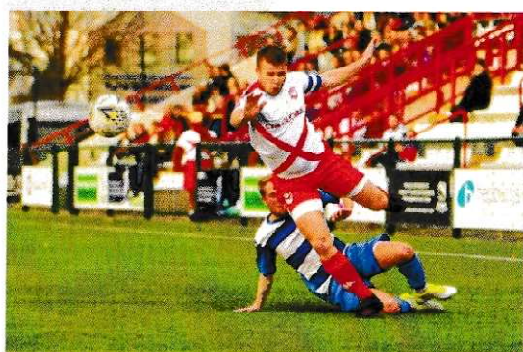


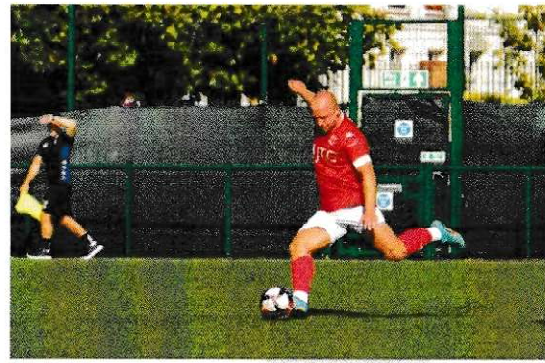
Our Previous Encounters at Springfield...

Jersey and Epsom have faced each other twice at Springfield, with both matches ending in 2-0 wins for the Bulls.

First Meeting – 16th November 2019 – Jersey Bulls 2-0 Epsom & Ewell

The first meeting, held in November 2019, was a tightly contested affair that saw Jersey overcome Epsom's defensive resilience late on. Jersey dominated the match, with high levels of possession and pressure, although their finishing touch eluded them for much of the match. The deadlock was finally broken late in the second half, when the Bulls were awarded a penalty, which was then coolly dispatched by Jay Giles. As Epsom pushed forward in search of an equaliser, Jersey were able to counter and this resulted in an unfortunate own goal in stoppage time. The match marked the first of two planned fixtures between the clubs, during the 2019-20 season, however, as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, the return leg was never played. The Bulls of course subsequently secured promotion to Step 5, as a result of FA re-organisation, however the Salt's fortunes would take a different trajectory, including their transfer to a new league for several seasons.

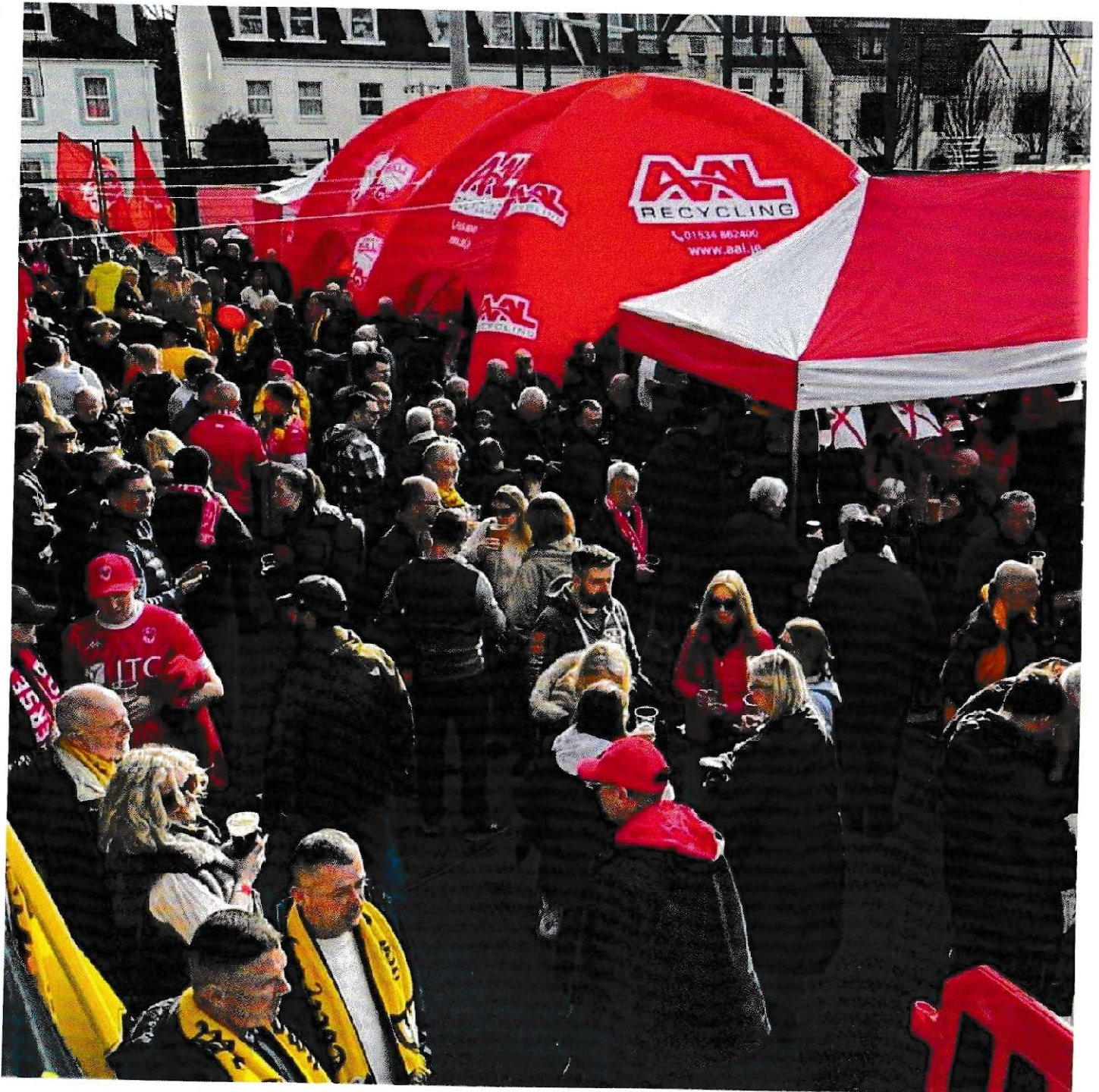




Second Meeting – 9th September 2023 – Jersey Bulls 2-0 Epsom & Ewell

Nearly four years later, Epsom returned to Springfield on a sweltering September afternoon, with temperatures reaching 31°C. Again, the visitors came into the match as underdogs, struggling at the bottom of the league table. Despite their league form, they had enjoyed some success in cup competitions, providing a glimmer of hope for an upset. The match began with Epsom deploying a deep five-man defensive line to frustrate Jersey's attacking prowess. Early chances for Jersey saw Lorne Bickley and Luke Watson testing Epsom's goalkeeper Harvey Keogh, who put on a superb display to keep the game level. Epsom also had their moments, with Ethan Nelson-Roberts firing just over the bar and Murisiku Batula causing problems. In an unusual turn of events, the heat forced the referee to step down mid-match, leading to Jersey's Assistant Manager, Kevan Nelson, taking over as linesman. Jersey's persistence paid off early in the second half. Adam Trotter's shot from the edge of the box took a wicked deflection, wrong-footing Keogh and giving the Bulls the lead. Like the 2019 encounter, as Epsom searched for an equaliser, Jersey sealed the win late on. Substitute Jake Mulholland played a clever ball to Jonny Le Quesne, who controlled it well, before an awkward touch off his shin directed the ball into the bottom corner.

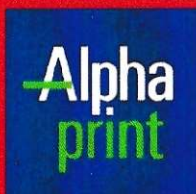
