MEET THE TEAM

Harry White – Goalkeeper

Harry joins Badshot Lea on a season loan deal from Step 3 Bracknell Town and made his Baggies debut in the 3-1 win over Corinthian Casuals.

Starting at Woking FC playing in their Academy U18's set up, the man between the sticks had a similar move last campaign joining Sandhurst Town where he made nineteen Combined Counties appearances, his first senior game coming in November 2024 in their away win at Alton FC.

After another loan term at Bracknell earlier this year, they signed the shot stopper on a free transfer from Woking with The Robins sending him out to us to gain more senior first team football.

Jonas Cody – Goalkeeper

The young shot stopper comes to Badshot Lea after just being released from QPR's Development side.

Jonas had the strange role of not only playing as a goalkeeper but also used, on occasions, as an outfield player for the West London club during his spell in the U18 Professional Development League 2 where he played last season.

Will Lott – Goalkeeper

Will comes into the senior squad after keeping goal for Badshot Lea's U18's set up last season. Will was part of the successful double league winning academy and played in The Baggies trip to Bristol Rovers for their 1st Round Proper of the FA Youth Cup.

Adam New – Defender/ Anywhere he wants!

Our new manager has signed forms as an 'emergency only' he will tell us!

Newy was one of the victorious Badshot Lea team that gained promotion to Step 4 in 2022 and stopped playing to become our U18's manager. Before that he had a two-year spell playing in New Zealand as well as stints at Westfield and Hartley Wintney.

An imposing central defender, Adam played the occasional game for Hartley last term where he was first team coach.

Freddie Jamieson – Defender

A local lad, Freddie Jamieson was part of the U13's side of Aldershot & Farnborough Schools to win the National Cup beating Liverpool on penalties in the final.

Move on a few years and the defender joined Sutton United as part of their U18's Academy and was also Badshot Lea's U18 captain in their league winning season in 2023/24.

Kit Littlefield - Defender

Central defender Kit moves up to the Badshot Lea senior side after progressing through the age groups of our Youth and Colts sides from U14 level. Was a member of the league winning U18's last season and is a student at the Vita Footballing Academy.

Ruben Mayani – Defender

Ruben signs from now Step 6 Sandhurst Town where he played on eighteen occasions last season at centre back.

Ruben also played for Swindon Town's U19 Precision Football Academy last year where he made seventeen appearances scoring two goals.

Conor Allison - Defender

Almost ever-present last year for Sandhurst where he made thirty-two appearances and scored two goals, the 25-year-old centre back joined Badshot Lea in the summer.

He took a year out from football before signing for Windsor & Eton in August 2023 from Eversley & California. Before that Conor started his senior career at Cove when in the 2018/19 campaign, he made thirty -two outings and again scored twice.

Will Shaw – Defender

Will arrived to us from Yateley United and has had various experience at Holyport FC, Wokingham Town, Binfield, Reading City, Camberley Town and Sheerwater. An experienced player who can also play at right back.

Archie Sheppard - Defender

The 6ft 6" central defender joins Badshot Lea after being released from EFL club Huddersfield Town in 2024 where he was a regular for their U19's side. He also spent a spell on loan at Bury AFC in 2022 and since moving back down south has been part of Hartley Wintney's U21 development squad

Harrison Stevens – Defender

Harrison is a centre back on loan from Woking FC where he has been playing for their academy side but has, since the summer, been retained and will form a part of Woking FC's inaugural U21 Elite Development Squad. Originally playing in AFC Wimbledon's youth set up, Harrison joined the Kingfield outfit in July 2023.

Morgan Elliot - Defender

Morgan comes across from Sandhurst Town where he made 21 appearances and scored one goal after a spell on loan from Aldershot Town. The centre back spent three years in Aldershot Town's academy, winning the club's player of the season at Under 18 level and then progressed through to the U21's in season 2023/24.

He was snapped up by Baggies boss Adam New after he was released from Aldershot in June.

Frankie Jamieson - Midfielder

As a youngster he was at Basingstoke Lions, but Frankie moved on and was part of the Farnham Town Development team in 2022 making eight appearances & scoring four times for our neighbours & after a 4-1 win over The Baggies in March of that year when he opened the scoring, they claimed the title.

We got our own back! As he made his senior debut last season for Guildford City against

Badshot Lea in a 2-0 defeat in the Aldershot Senior Cup. Frankie joined Adam News's squad this summer.

Josef Phillipson – Midfielder

Josef was part of the Badshot Lea U18's development side who lifted the title last campaign and played an integral part in the club's FA Youth Cup exploits eventually ending in extra time at Bristol Rovers. Made his first team debut last season coming on as a sub in our home league victory against Ashford Town in January 2025.

Fareed Hakeem-Habeeb – Midfielder

This was quite a coup for new manager Adam New to prise the winger from Fleet Town over to Westfield Lane. A product of the Fleet Town youth team, he is a player who already has over 45 first team Combined Counties games under his belt, making his senior debut in November 2023. He was one of our neighbours stars last year eventually reaching the play offs at the end of last term and had been with the club for over three years.

Brandon Vangrove - Midfielder

Brandon was one of the Pulse Academy successes, he has already amassed over half a century first team games in this division and moves over from Camberley Town where he was highly thought of. Last season he started twenty-one times and scored three goals for his previous club.

Oliver St-Vincent – Midfielder

Oli comes to Westfield Lane on a dual registration with National Conference side Eastleigh FC.

So far to date, Oli has been playing for the Under 19's in the Youth Alliance and National League for The Spitfires where last season he made fifteen appearances and scored three goals.

Callum Kent – Midfielder

Callun joins Badshot Lea from Aldershot Town's U19 academy where last year he played thirteen games and scored two goals.

Josh Smith – Midfielder

Josh joins Badshot Lea after playing in the Combined Counties with Sheerwater and Sandhurst Town at senior level and for Sheerwater in their U23's Development side where he helped The Sheers reach the Semi-Finals of the Surrey Premier County Cup last season, whilst also competing for them in the Suburban Football League Central Division.

Louis Pask – Midfielder

The 18-year-old winger born in Frimley comes to Badshot Lea from Woking FC where Louis was a regular in their Academy campaign last year. Our new signing scored twice in November last year to send Woking into the 3rd Round Proper of the FA Youth Cup where they were eventually knocked out by Stoke City. Louis went out on loan to Camberley Town in January to gain senior football experience and mainly from the bench, was involved in a dozen first team games in the Combined Counties League last season.

Louis Everett - Midfielder

Louis is another player who has come through the ranks of Badshot Lea's U18's and made his senior debut in the first league game of the season against Thatcham. Everett is a student at Pulse.

Jake Pickett – Midfielder

Jake moves up a level and across from Combined Counties Division One side Hillingdon Borough after eighty first team appearances where last year he played in 42 games scoring five goals as Borough just failed to make the play offs. He also played in the week for QPR College U19's where he made twenty-one starts and scored on thirteen occasions.

Such of his potential, Jake was selected last year to join up with the National Football League representative side playing one game at the FA's St Georges Park.

Tom Hill – Midfielder

The 20 year old central midfielder has a wealth of experience at this level having played for Alton in this division last season where he played on thirty occasions before an injury kept

him out of action for three months.

An ex under 10 at Badshot Lea, Tom has played for Aldershot and Farnborough in their district set up's and was also at Aldershot Town's Academy where he spent the best part of five years at, progressing through to The Shot's U19's and U23's squads.

Xander Ewing - Midfielder

Xander is a player from the Pulse Academy who cut his teeth in senior football last season playing twenty-one times for Camberley Town. He scored one goal last season against Guildford City, a 40-yard screamer which was voted as 'Goal of the Season' at the end of year Camberley awards!

Before moving up to the first team, Xander was a member of Camberley's U18 Development squad.

Stan Jones - Forward

Another exciting prospect who has bags of Step 5 games under his belt after completing two seasons at Camberley Town, the winger made over a hundred appearances in all competition for his previous club before moving across to join Badshot Lea. In 2023/24 he notched up forty league games scoring on five occasions and last year he turned out for Town in similar vein scoring six goals.

Alfie Edmonds – Midfielder

Alfie joins Adam New's squad from Hartley Wintney after signing for the Step 4 side in March of this year where he made seven appearances. Formerly at Camberley Town and more recently Sandhurst Town where he was ever present last season before his move up a tier.

Erik Kerage – Forward

Last season Erik was with Clanfield FC who play at Step 6 in The Wessex League Division One. His side from Waterloooville finished in midtable as our new recruit looks to step up a level.

Luke Jarvie - Forward

Luke had previously won the Isthmian League Youth West Division the campaign before last with Camberley Town and was snapped up by Badshot Lea in September 2024 where he scored a hat-trick on his debut for our U18's Development Side. Such of his progress & maturity, he made a number of first team appearances last campaign, his Baggies debut coming in a 1-1 draw against Met Police in February 2025.

Ben Thompson - Forward

Returns to Badshot Lea after rather controversially being released by the then management to join Eversley & California FC, came back only to be let out on loan this time to gain experience last season at Step 5 Sandhurst. A product of our successful U18's squad, Ben originally made his Baggies debut at Met Police back in January 2024 and made one substitute appearance last term for the first team.

Before joining the Westfield Lane set up, he was a youngster at Churt Juniors.

Ben Jordan - Forward

A product of Pulse Academy, Ben is another player who joins The Baggies from Camberley Town. His step up to senior football proved fruitful last season where he played nine times and scored on a trio of occasions for the fellow Combined Counties Premier South club all coming in the away game at Sandhurst where he bagged himself a hat trick. In the Youth team, he scored for fun – goals that helped Camberley runaway with the Allied Counties West Division last season. Got off the mark for Badshot Lea with a brace in the FA Cup game v Steyning Town.

Luis Hamblin - Forward

Hamblin will be known to Baggies fans after making six appearances for us in the Isthmian League South Central when he joined from Camberley Town.

Luis in fact scored on his debut to send The Baggies into the Qtr Finals of the Velocity (Isthmian) League Cup in January 2024 against Chipstead, prior to that he made 23 appearances scoring 15 times in Step 5 for Camberley, again marking his debut with a goal against Lydd Town in the FA Cup.

He was prolific too for Camberley's U18's the campaign before when he notched up SEVENTY goals in all competition. In January 2025 he joined Melville United in the semi-pro league in New Zealand and returns to the UK waiting for FA International clearance.

AROUND THE CLUB

We take a look at newcomers on the pitch and what we are doing to make Badshot Lea a better, sustainable football club off of it...

Alfie Edmonds made his Badshot Lea debut coming on as a half time substitute for Jake Pickett in the 5-3 win over Eversley & California a fortnight ago.



He is no stranger to team boss Adam New as the Baggies manager was his coach last season when he was at Hartley Wintney. The Row signed the midfielder on a dual registration in March of this year which saw Edmonds move up to become a step 4 player after being ever present at Sandhurst in the tier below.

Edmonds made his first appearance for Hartley in the game away at Hanworth Villa and was also part of the side that defeated Farnham Town last campaign.

Although his contribution for the Hampshire side was mainly from the bench, his twenty five starts at his previous club in the Combined Counties Premier South last term saw him score two goals and enough promise to get him his move and was re-signed by Hartley at the start of the 25/26 season.

Before Sandhurst, Edmonds was playing for Camberley Town.

Another recruit was signed on Monday evening. Into the Baggies squad for our game with Epsom & Ewell comes experienced full back **Will Shaw** who moves from Step 6 Yateley United after only signing for the



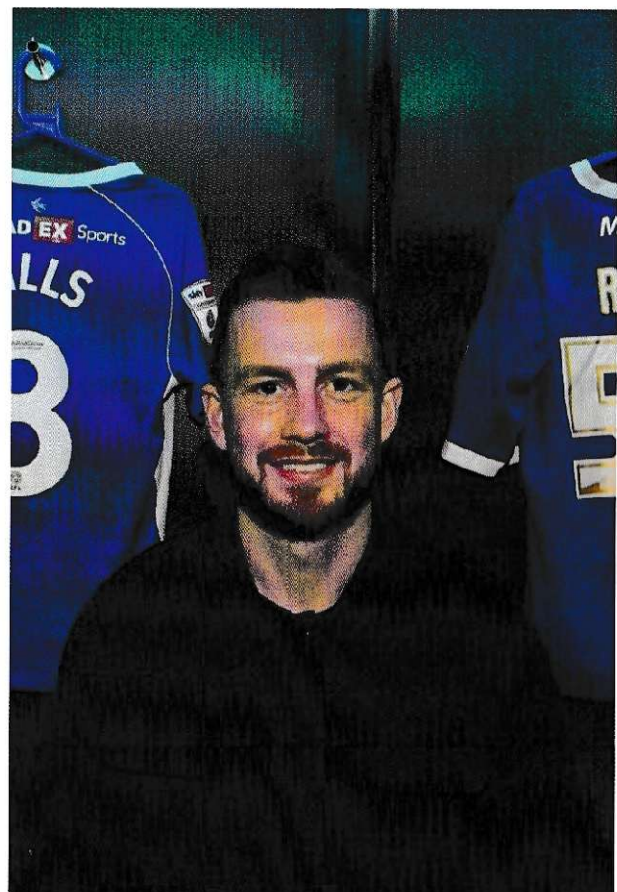
Hampshire side in the summer. Previous to that Shaw was at Holyport FC, Reading City and Camberley Town but has also played for Binfield, Wokingham Town, Sheerwater and Penn &

Tylers Green.

We welcome two new sponsors to the club this month.

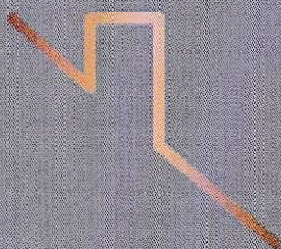

THE MAN DOWN UNDER

Luis Hamblin came to Badshot Lea on loan two season's ago and played six times for The Baggies.

Half a campaign last year scoring goals for fun for Camberley Town, the 20-year-old ex-Aldershot Town Academy player decided to fly 11,500 miles away to take part in the New Zealand Football League.

Having probably never bought bread from a man from Brussels, nor is he six foot four and full of muscles, I sat down with the striker to find out what life was like down under and why he re-joined us here at Westfield Lane.

Tell us about your football journey so far?

I started at Camberley playing for their Under 18's, then had a year in the Aldershot Town Academy, returned to Camberley last season and played for their senior side in the Combined Counties and then left to play in New Zealand.

Your goal to game ratio whilst at Camberley was pretty impressive...

Yeah, I enjoyed it there, I scored a load for the U18's and then last year managed fifteen goals in the twenty-three games I played in before making the move to try my luck on the other side of the world.

You are of course no stranger to Badshot Lea having spent a while on loan to us during our first season in the Isthmian League what

was that like?

It was a really good experience and great to test myself at that level. We had a good side here and to finish mid table in the first season in step 4 was a big achievement.

So, you played half a season at Camberley last year, leaving to play in New Zealand in January, how did that move come about?

I was a student at Pulse where Paul Harkness has a lot of contacts over in New Zealand and was looking for lads to go and play for various sides over there. I just felt it was too good an opportunity to miss out on so agreed, packed my bags, and joined Melville United for the start of their campaign this year. The deal was a six month one as their season starts in February and goes on until later into our summer. A few of the boys from Badshot Lea in the past have done the same, Newy did it around six years ago and played for North Shore and I had heard amazing things about their time out there so thought why not?

So, what happens? Do you go out there with anyone? Where do you stay? How does it work?

No, I went out there on my own, didn't know a soul when I arrived and got put up with a host family through the club. After a couple of weeks, football being football, you start to make good friends with your teammates and we rented a house and three of us split rent and stayed there.

What sort of standard is it?

It's a similar standard to step 5 over here. I think if Melville played Badshot Lea it would be a good close contest. In New Zealand there are only two professional clubs, Auckland FC and Wellington Phoenix and they play in the Australian A League, the rest of the bigger clubs are basically part time and play in the New Zealand Northern League. Melville are currently in the division below, the NRFL Championship which is a feeder to that top league, so in the second tier.



How do you fund the trip, are you paid or do you have to work on the side to live?

So, the club set you up with a contract to coach younger players and you are also paid to play, that gives you enough money to live a bit, pay the rent etc.

What sort of crowds are you playing in front of?

I'd say similar to the sort of attendances you'd get in the Isthmian League where The Baggies were playing last season. Our local derby was against Hamilton Wanderers attracted around 700 to 800 people which was a good atmosphere to play in, but I guess the average crowds are a couple of hundred.

Are all the other players home grown?

A bit of a mix really, the majority of our side were Kiwi's but we had three others who had come in like me from the UK.

Is it two games a week like most of the time over here?

No, as the league only has twelve teams in it, it tends to be just Saturday's unless you progress to the later stages of the cup. We were training Monday evenings and again on Tuesdays and Thursdays, playing Saturday afternoons.

Was it your choice to come back or had the contract expired?

No not my choice as they still had games left in the league and we were top at that time. The money simply dried up in the club, their grant funders pulled it all and all contracts were cancelled. All the imported players like me who relied on that money to live had to come home. They still have a couple of games to go but have dropped to third now in the table which is a real shame.

What's life like over in New Zealand?

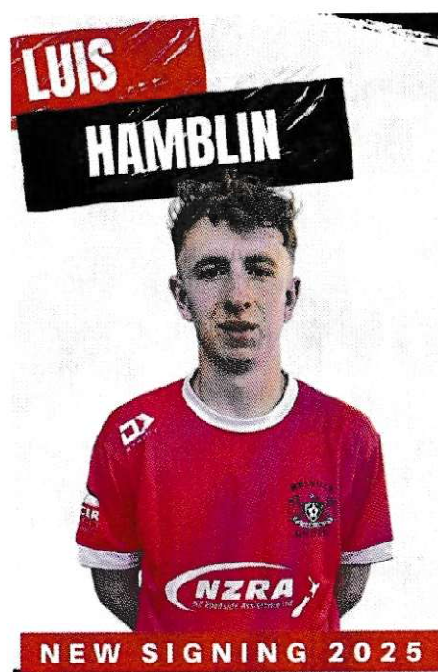
Different.

Much slower than over here, not as serious, everyone seems to be enjoying life, having a laugh, getting on with each other.

Did you learn the 'Hakka' when you were there?!

No unfortunately I didn't!

It's a Māori tradition so not practiced by all the folk out there and not even many of the British



Kiwi's seem to know how to do it.

Is football secondary to cricket out there?

Rugby Union is by far the most popular sport, probably followed by cricket in the summer and football in the winter. The rugby season coincides with the football one but football is gaining in popularity out there. I went to see one rugby match whilst I was there and the Kiwi's are passionate about their game.

All in all, a good experience?

An amazing experience. You go out there not knowing anyone and then come home with friends for life. I'd urge anyone who has the opportunity, to go and do it, 100%. Don't get settled into a job straight away, go and play football out there, experience as much as you can whilst you are young. It's the best decision I have so far made in life.

So, you came back to England, why Badshot Lea?

I'd enjoyed my time here previously and knew Adam really well as he used to coach me whilst I was at Pulse. He spoke with me and really sold the club to me, what he wants to do here, the aspirations of the club, how he wants his team to play and I jumped at the chance. I had to wait for International clearance from the FA which was a bit frustrating so had to sit out the first few games whilst that went through, but Newy becoming manager was the main

Did you know many of the boys here already?

A few have come in from Camberley who I already knew and he's attracted a lot of the ex-Academy lads which is good. I knew Brandon and a couple of the others but in football you make friends quickly so it was never going to be a problem.

Compared to the last time you were with us, how has the management, training and game set up differed?

To be fair I didn't really train with Badshot during my first stay as I was on loan and training was at Aldershot Town during the week. I enjoyed playing for Gav, he was good but equally I'm enjoying it here now with Adam as manager too.

Style of play is a bit different, with Gav it seemed that we wanted to go a bit more direct at the time I was here whereas Newy wants us to play more football with a lot more youngsters in the team, but to be fair to Gav, I was here during January and February so the pitches we were playing on were poor and that was probably what suited at the time.

What are your expectations with us this season?

Play-offs, hopefully the play-offs.

I feel we need a bit more experience in the team as the boys are so young, but there is an immense amount of quality here in the squad and we should be ok. The boys are quick, the football we want to play is fast tempo, there are a hell of a lot of skilful players down here.

At the age of twenty you must feel like the old man in the squad?!

Strangely enough, apart from the manager, I've made more Badshot Lea appearances than any other player here! I think our eldest player is twenty-four, so yep, I guess I'm one of the more 'senior' players here!!

Luis has already been formidable on his return scoring so far on six occasions in his six appearances. It's good to have him back – Thanks to Luis for taking time out for the interview.

EPSOM & EWELL CLUB HISTORY

The club were founded in March 1918 as Epsom Juniors Cricket Club and competitive football followed as they entered the Surrey Junior League in 1919, and became founder members of the Sutton & District League in 1920.

A change of name in July 1922 to Epsom Town F.C. heralded the start of a very successful era winning three trophies that season, and also winning the Sutton & District League. Moving into Intermediate Football, Epsom won the Southern Suburban League without losing a match. Senior football was granted as we were unanimously accepted into the Surrey Senior League for 1924/25, where we finished third.

In September 1925, the club relocated to the old Ewell F.C. ground at West Street and in 1925/26 won the Championship of the Surrey Senior League. The following season, completing a League and Cup "double", election to the London League followed, and the title was claimed in the first attempt in 1927/28. A spell of finishing runners-up there on, in 1929 Redhill defeated Epsom 3-2 in front of 4,600 at Guildford in our first Surrey Senior Cup Final, having seen off Wimbledon 4-1 in the semi-final.

The thirties were a very successful era, they won the Surrey Charity (Senior) Shield in 1933 and appeared in the First Round Proper of the F.A.Cup in 1933/34. A crowd of 9,485 at the Lea Bridge Speedway Stadium witnessed a 4-2 loss against the hosts Clapton Orient. At the end of that season, we changed our name to Epsom F.C.

After the war, Epsom F.C. restarted, continuing in the London League and reclaimed West Street and in 1949 joined the Corinthian League. With the signing of the former English Amateur International Pat Lynch from Hendon, Epsom finished third in 1952/53, while in 1954 they reached the Surrey Senior

Cup Final for the second time in our history, losing unluckily 2-0 to Corinthian-Casuals in front of 6,159 at Selhurst Park. In 1955 they won the Surrey Senior Shield with a 1-0 win over Carshalton Athletic at West Street.

In 1960 we changed our name once again to Epsom & Ewell F.C. In 1963 the Corinthian League merged with the Athenian and Delphian Leagues, and Epsom & Ewell were placed in Division One of the new structure, but the sixties were full of poor results and we were relegated in 1965.

Their fortunes did not improve significantly and further relegations were avoided in the early seventies only by the benefit of re-election. However in 1973, despite the Athenian League ran out of patience and they found themselves in The Surrey Senior League.

In 1974/75 the club achieved a second Surrey Senior League "double". However, the season would always be remembered for reaching the Final of the inaugural F.A. Vase, where 9,500 saw the Blues edged out 2-1 by Hoddesdon Town at Wembley Stadium.

The Athenian League welcomed us back, and promotion was achieved in that first season. In 1976/77 we reached the Athenian League Cup Final, losing 1-0 at Chalfont St Peter.

Epsom & Ewell were invited to join the expanding Isthmian League for 1977/78, and were placed in the new Division Two and the title was clinched the following April, securing a move to Division One. In 1979/80 we won the Southern Combination Cup and they won the Surrey Senior Cup in 1981, defeating Woking 2-1 at Tooting & Mitcham, although they just missed out on promotion.

In 1983/84 we clinched a spot in the Premier Division as runners-up, although relegation followed in 1986 after the then manager resigned moving to Croydon and with him, taking a lot of their senior players.

In 1993 a large chapter in our history ended as the club left West Street and moved in as tenants of Banstead Athletic. The decade was largely one of frustration, until in 2002 when manager Adrian Hill took us back up to the newly created Division 1 South. Hill's retirement at the end of the season led to relegation a year later and then in 2006 The Salts were transferred into the Combined Counties League Premier Division.

In 2009/10 the club reached the last 32 of the F.A. Vase for the first time in 21 years, bowing out 3-2 to Long Buckby and in April of 2010, they terminated the seventeen-year ground-sharing agreement with Banstead Athletic and spent two unspectacular seasons at Merstham F.C. before relocating to High Road, home of Chipstead F.C. for the 2012/13 season, where they stayed for eight seasons.

The 2011/12 season brought significant playing success as Epsom finished fifth and the club's first silverware since 1981 defeating South Park 3-0 to win the Combined Counties League Cup.

In the summer of 2016, our club visited France and played a friendly against our twin town Chantilly, which was where the England team had been based before their Euro 2016 campaign. The players were able to meet Roy Hodgson and Gary Neville.

In 2016/17 we started the season with an incredible 9-2 win at newly-promoted Bedfont and managed a fourth-place finish in the League. In addition, Epsom reached the League Cup Final but were defeated 4-1 by Westfield.

However, in the summer of 2017, we suffered a large player exodus with a substantial number joining local rivals Sutton Common Rovers

and relegation was confirmed in mid-April; not a great way to celebrate our Centenary!

The 2020/21 season commenced with another ground move, this time to Leatherhead's Fetcham Grove ground, although another seasonal curtailment left us in seventh place and we remained at Step Six, being transferred to the Southern Combination for the new season.

In August 2021, Sam Morgan was relieved of his duties after a slow start to the season. Darren Anslow was appointed as new manager although the 2022/23 season saw a complete change at the top with Ex Horley Town manager Anthony Jupp coming in as joint manager alongside Ex Croydon manager Liam Giles although both stepped down after a year.

Coach Matt Chapman took over and led the Club to the Runners up spot. Beating Selsey in the Semi Final they met Wick in front of almost 400 fans in our last game at Leatherhead F.C. winning 2-1 and were promoted back to step five.

2023/24 Season the Club also started a new ground share agreement with Cobham F.C. on their brand new 3G pitch. 2024/25 season saw the Club move again this time to Corinthian Casuals F.C. Warren Burton continued as manager but left towards the end of the season. The Salts appointed joint managers in Max Johnson and Craig Dundas, and lifted Silverware winning the Southern Combination Cup beating Abbey Rangers 1-0. 2025/26 season saw the Club move back to Cobham and a move to Chessington will start in October 2025.

Meanwhile, the search continues for a new ground back in the Borough...



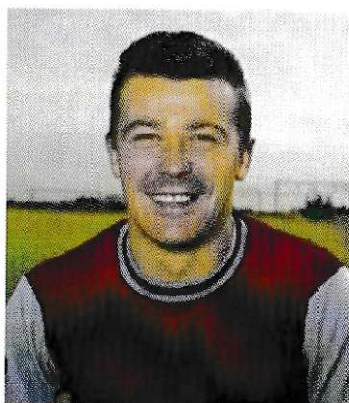

SALTS OF THE EARTH...

Nick Hester searches through the history books and finds four ex Epsom & Ewell players who have represented their country!

Striker **John Byrne** played for Epsom before an amazing pro career where he made over 400 appearances and scored an incredible 171 goals in his eleven year career playing at Crystal Palace, West Ham and a short spell at Fulham.



Nicknamed 'Budgie' because he never stopped talking, the 5ft 9" forward born in West Horsley near Guildford had plenty to tell.

Whilst at Epsom, Byrne had four trials at Selhurst Park and was eventually signed in 1956 at the age of seventeen. He went on to play just over two hundred games and left the club after notching up 101 goals which was a post war record now headed by Ian Wright with 118. In fact over his two spells at Palace, Byrne is still the 8th all time scorer for The Eagles since their formation.

In 1962, Ron Greenwood paid a Second Division British record transfer fee of £65,000 to take "Budgie" to West Ham United.

The 1962-63 season saw him score 14 goals in all competitions, only one behind leading scorer Geoff Hurst. The season after he pipped Bobby Moore, who finished second, to the "Hammer of the Year" award as West Ham won the FA Cup. Byrne had amassed 33 goals from 45 games in all competitions that season overtaking Hurst as top goal-scorer.

In Europe West Ham competed in the 1964-65 European Cup Winners' Cup. Byrne scored in the first round against La Gantoise, the third round against Lausanne and a goal in the semi-finals against Real Zaragoza. Now a full England International, Byrne was injured in the game against Scotland match a few weeks earlier and did not play in the final against Munich 1860 at Wembley Stadium which West Ham won 2-0.

In the 1965-66 season West Ham were again in European football as holders of the Cup Winners' Cup. They also reached the 1966 League Cup Final. Again Byrne was on the

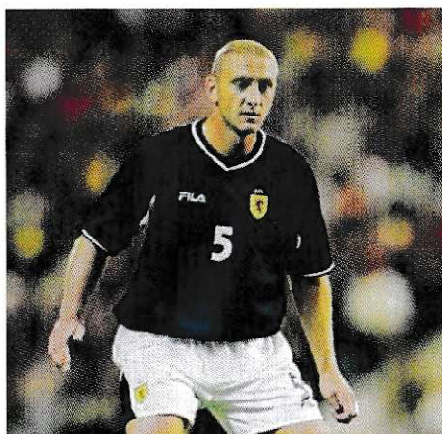
scoresheet in the Cup Winners' Cup, in the second round against Olympiacos, the third round against Magedeburg and in the semi-final against Borussia Dortmund where they were eliminated from the competition. Byrne finished the season with 17 goals in all competitions, somewhat behind Geoff Hurst, who, on the verge of his 1966 World Cup victory, scored 40 goals in 59 games.

Byrne went back to Palace in February 1967 for a fee of £45,000 and stayed there for a season and a half. He further made another 36 appearances but only scored five times and in March 1968 moved across London to Fulham where his time there was mainly unsuccessful. Byrne decided to leave Craven Cottage for South Africa, to play for the now defunct Durban City, alongside some of his former Fulham teammates including Johnny Haynes. After hanging up his playing boots, 'Budgie' became their manager.

Internationally, he was England's 'so nearly' man. Although playing for the Three Lions eleven times and scoring eight goals, he narrowly missed out on two World Cup call ups. At the time, he was a strong candidate to be selected for the 1962 FIFA World Cup in Chile, but he was shunned by the Football Association's selectors after getting involved in a confrontation with former England favourite Don Howe in a league match at The Hawthorns, he also just missed out in the victorious 1966 squad four years later.

It was November 1961 when Byrne was called up to the England team earning his first full cap, despite playing outside the top two divisions at the time, becoming one of only five post-war players to achieve this. Byrne played the whole of the 1-1 draw against Northern Ireland, part of the 1962 British Home Championship, at Wembley Stadium. He got his first (and second) England goal in the 1-8 win over Switzerland. On 16 May 1964, possibly Byrne's greatest achievement came, as he scored a hat-trick, in Lisbon, in England's 4-3 win over a Portugal team that included Eusébio.

Taking those memories with him, Byrne died suddenly following a heart attack in Cape Town on 27 October 1999, aged just 60.



Matt Elliott began his career in non-league football with Leatherhead and Epsom & Ewell. Playing for our visitors this evening during the season of 1987/88, The Salts

finished that campaign in 5th in the bottom rung of the Isthmian League (Division Two) when he received his first taste of professional football with Charlton Athletic. Unable to break into the Charlton first-team, he moved to Torquay United within a year. He then worked his way up the ladder, signing for Scunthorpe United in March 1992, moving on to Oxford United in November 1993, and finally getting his chance in the Premiership when he was signed by Leicester City in early 1997 for a transfer fee of £1.6 million.

Elliott became a mainstay in a Leicester side that surprised many in the top flight. The defender became synonymous with The Foxes' style of play that made them one of the hardest sides to play in the Premiership. Elliott sometimes courted controversy with his discipline throughout his time at Leicester, but remained a key player under both Martin O'Neill and his successor Peter Taylor.

Elliott was influential in Leicester's run to the 2000 Football League Cup Final, and their victory in the game itself. He scored the only goal of the two-legged semi-final against Aston Villa and then scored both goals in the final as Leicester beat Tranmere Rovers 2-1.

When Martin O'Neill left to manage Celtic in July 2000, he made an attempt to lure Elliott to the club in a £3.5 million bid. It was unsuccessful when Elliott signed the last contract of his career in August 2001, which would last until June 2005 choosing to stay with The Foxes.

He had a loan spell at Ipswich Town before his retirement. His final season was thwarted by a knee injury and, after making only three appearances, Elliott retired from football in January 2005.

Elliott won 18 caps for the Scotland national team, scoring one goal which was a header from an Allan Johnston cross in a 2-0 win against San Marino. He made 16 starts and two appearances from the bench, including his debut against France in November 1997. He

was in the Scotland squad for the 1998 World Cup although he did not appear in any of the games.

Despite being at Millwall and Crystal Palace as a youth player and moving to Dagenham & Redbridge in 2002 from Woking, **Nic Taylor** was unable to break into the first team at the League Two club and thus has never played on the professional stage.

He has however played for Epsom & Ewell AND represented his country at full International level!

Taylor joined Southern League Premier Division side Hemel Hempstead Town on loan – making sporadic appearances for the first team while lining-up for the Reserves. Upon his return to the Daggers, he joined Isthmian Premier Division side Kingstonian on loan. The deal was later made permanent, but the goalkeeper only managed a single senior appearance, keeping a clean sheet in a 3-0 win at Walton & Hersham in the Isthmian League Cup second round.

In October 2011 he departed Kingsmeadow to join Epsom & Ewell. Finally cementing his place in a senior side, he remained with the Salts until the conclusion of the 2011-12 season. That year, Epsom finished 14th and one point above Badshot Lea in the Combined Counties Premier Division.

After a spell at Tooting & Mitcham and then Chipstead, in 2014 the keeper found himself at Cray Wanderers during when he was called up to represent Montserrat and in March 2014 he featured in a 1-0 win over the US Virgin Islands in the 2014 Gold Cup. His second international cap came during a 0-0 draw with Bonaire on 3 June 2014. Taylor was named on the bench in two fixtures against Curaçao in 2018 World Cup qualification a year later, but did not feature.

In 2001/2002 a certain **Howard Newton** played five games for Epsom & Ewell. After several other non-league clubs, Newton joined Staines Town and whilst there made his debut at International level for Guyana on 22 February 2008 in a 2-1 friendly victory over Cuba. He went on to make a further 11 appearances, with his final outing coming in a 3-1 defeat to Mexico on 8 June 2012. Following his debut, Newton played in just one other victory for the national side, appearing in a 2-0 victory over Barbados on 7 October 2011 in 2014 FIFA World Cup Qualification.

Epsom sink Baggies with late goals – again EPSOM & EWELL 4, BADSHOT LEA 2 – Saturday 4th February 2017 Match Report by Farnham Herald

The score is misleading because Badshot Lea led 2-1 at one stage and Epsom & Ewell only killed them off with two late goals on Saturday.

It mirrored the result of the earlier Combined Counties League meeting between the sides back in September when Epsom also needed late goals to clinch a 4-1 victory.

The Baggies kept home keeper Michael Eacott busy in the early stages, but it was Epsom who took the lead on 19 minutes, Jason Nwachukwu cutting the ball back for Matt Ferdinando to shoot across Lee Allen into the far corner.

The lead lasted just nine minutes. Epsom waited for an offside flag that never came and after a goal-line clearance by James Taylor, Leke Somule followed in to put away the loose ball.

Five minutes before half-time, the Baggies shook high-riding Epsom by taking the lead, Benga Ogunseye making no mistake from close range.

Alas, the visitors could not take their advantage into half-time. Three minutes later, Nwachukwu blasted home his first goal for Epsom.

Some gritty defensive work and good saves from Allen looked like earning Badshot Lea a creditable point in the second half, however, Epsom brought on leading scorer Daryl Cooper-Smith with 14 minutes to go and, almost immediately, the change did the trick. Jordan Gallagher crossed low into the box and Cooper-Smith poached his 26th goal of the season.

And as the game went into injury time, a lucky deflection enabled Ferdinando to snap up his second goal, leaving the Baggies with nothing to show for a spirited effort.

Salts Made to Wait Before Clinching the Points BADSHOT LEA 1, EPSOM & EWELL 4 – Saturday 17th September 2016 Match Report by Richard Lambert (Epsom & Ewell Website)

To look at the result only, you might think that this was a comfortable away win at Badshot Lea at their temporary home of Ash United and in some ways it was, however the teams were level for almost an hour and it required two late goals before Epsom were finally able to relax with the points secured.

Epsom faced many problems before the start of the match with many absentees, not helped when captain Dan Dean had to pull out on Friday night with the flu. With two more on holiday, this left us with just a fourteen-man squad which included injured Matt Ferdinando and assistant manager Matt Smith.

From the team that failed to find the net against Camberley Town in the 0-0 draw seven days previously, it took The Salts just 70 seconds to open their account after a Rob Hendry corner was brought down and lashed into the net by Daryl Cooper-Smith from about ten yards to claim his 12th of the season.

He went close again a few minutes later when his shot from a similar distance, flashed past Baggies Keeper Pat Kinsella's far post and moments later Matt Farrell was on the end of a Cooper-Smith cross but was unable to keep his header down. All this action happened in the first few minutes of the game.

Understandably, it was frustrating for all to concede an equaliser after all that pressure in the 9th minute when a pin point cross from the Badshot Lea left wing was headed in by the unmarked Jacob McDonald – the scores were now level.

Despite the equaliser, Epsom saw much of the possession and it only appeared to be time until the visitors regained the lead. On the half hour James Taylor had a chance cleared off the Baggies line and three minutes later Jordan Gallagher failed to find an unmarked Reisse Griffin and the chance had gone.

As the half ended, the game had become a little more even and the Epsom fans wondered if we would be able to make the breakthrough, that was reinforced when Griffins low ball dangerously fizzing inside the six-yard box was met by Gallagher but somehow his touch was sent over the crossbar.

The second half started positively as both sides had chances, full back Adam Heagney nearly beat Baggies keeper Kinsella who saved at full stretch and at the other end Badshot nearly scored from a corner with Eacott making the save and matching his counterpart. Then on the hour mark, Jordan Gallagher broke free down the left, slotted the ball to Alex McKay who fired past Kinsella. Despite Badshot Lea protests of offside, it was to no avail 1-2.

Epsom should have put the game to bed seven minutes later as Cooper-Smith instead of hitting it first time decided to try and go round the keeper but Kinsella forced him too wide. Chances continued for Epsom but Gallagher was guilty of squandering more efforts when he should have been laying off to fellow teammates, however he redeemed himself in the 86th minute when he found Cooper-Smith, he in turn passed to Farrell who poked home to make it 1-3.

Matt Tanton limped off to be replaced by Epsom's assistant manager Matt Smith, his first game for 20 months but which marked his 135th for the club. A clever pass from Panayiotou put Smith through and deep into injury time, his low shot was parried by the Baggy Lea keeper but trickled over the line!

That was the last kick of the game, Epsom's 9th win in their last eleven away games, it was a deserved victory against a side who will need to improve if they are to fight relegation.

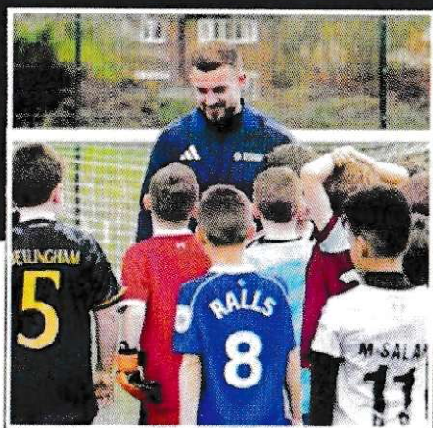

Badshot Lea's visit to Barlows Park next Saturday won't quite be the 'After the Lord Mayor's Show' fixture as in between, Tadley play catch up with a home fixture in between against Corinthian Casuals.

Their exploits in the FA Cup won't come as a surprise to some. Tadley were tipped to be dark horses this season after signing some quality individuals before a ball was kicked in July. So far in the league though they have struggled, losing to Eversley on the opening day, a 3-0 defeat in their next game v Redhill and their only win coming against Thatcham two weeks ago where they won 2-0.

On Saturday just gone they squandered a 2-1 lead at home to Fleet Town and had to settle for a draw after the visitor's Charlie Postance equalised in the 94th minute to keep Tadley in the bottom two.

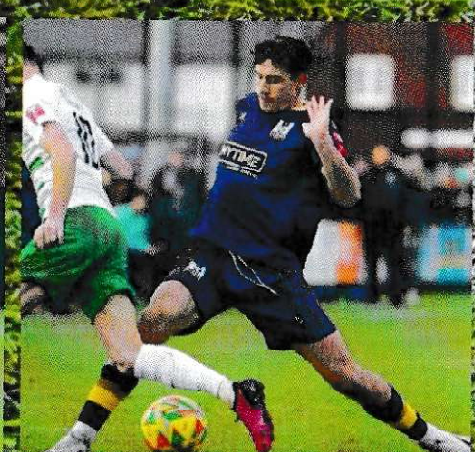

A lot of football will have been played since the time you are reading this and our trip to Redhill in three weeks' time, in fact our hosts will have met Camberley, Fleet, Sheerwater and Knaphill before The Baggies take on The Lobsters at Kiln Brow.

Redhill are one of the clubs who are fancied to be right up there this season. Last term they were caught up in the farce of the Combined Counties League taking weeks to decide who to promote, Redhill were top, then were 2nd and eventually found themselves in 3rd place after it was decided that they, along with Jersey Bulls had indeed fielded an illegible player with both clubs being deducted three points and our opponents would have to take part in the lottery of the play offs.

In the run up to those, attendances were reaching just under 600 at Kiln Brow, they even beat Jersey away in front of 1,900 in what was they both thought was the title decider but for Redhill, it was heartbreak as they fell to a play off defeat after penalties against Cobham and remained in this division.

They started this campaign in fine style, beating Knaphill 5-1 and Tadley Calleva 3-0 but then had a run of four games tasting defeat, in the FA Cup, FA Vase and league games versus Abbey Rangers and Chipstead. Their promotion hopes were back on course with a 2-1 win at Guildford over the bank holiday and on Saturday their 3-1 victory at home to Horley in front of a respectable crowd of 314 put them top of the table on goal difference from Badshot Lea & Abbey Rangers.

CHIPSTEAD FC HISTORY

Chipstead Football Club was formed in 1906, when the Netherne hospital was being built. The building workers and the lads in Chipstead challenged each other to a match. The oldest club records dated 1911 show a far from healthy position, survival relying mainly on the proceeds of whist drives. The club's health began to improve and, in 1920, it even had its own transport for away games, an open topped lorry owned by a local builder.

Up until the 1962/63 season, Chipstead played junior football, but, having finished runners-up in the County Junior Cup the previous year, they then moved into the Surrey Intermediate League. The club played at this standard until 1982, when they became founder members of the Surrey Premier League.

After a long battle, the club were awarded senior status in 1986 and were promoted to the Combined Counties League, where once again success followed; a League Championship was won in 1989/90 and a runners-up spot was gained on two occasions, combined with six League Cup Final appearances, and in Season 1987/88 the club made its debut in the F.A. Vase and the following year in the FA Cup.

Over recent years the club has continued to grow and strengthen its youth policy with some 200 players between the ages of six and eighteen involved every week. Two former Chipstead youth players - Leon McKenzie and Steve Sidwell moved on to professional clubs, & more recently, Saidou Khan who played for our 1st team, is now with Tranmere Rovers.

The Combined Counties Championship winning squad contained no fewer than 12 players, who had represented the club at youth level.

In 1998 Chipstead was able to purchase the freehold of the ground from the Local Authority.

Thanks to a grant from the F.A. in 2001, the club was able to purchase additional land, which was developed into mini-soccer pitches to further enhance its youth policy. In November 2004 a 100-seater stand was installed, which was increased to 150 in March 2007. In May 2006 a covered standing area for 150 people was also erected.

2006-07 was the club's 'Centenary' season, and the hope was that it would be a memorable one. By February, Chipstead were top and the decision was made to do the necessary work to achieve the ground upgrading. The team remained top and promotion to the Ryman League was achieved for the first time in 100 years.

In the 2007-08 season Chipstead established themselves in the Ryman League finishing a creditable 15th. They also went on to win the Southern Combination Cup beating Ryman Premier side Ashford Town (Middlesex) in the final. The next campaign, Chipstead struggled in the league, but, in the FA Cup, reached the 4th qualifying round for the first time in their history, eventually losing at Torquay United.

2010-11 saw Chipstead finished 10th being their highest position ever. 2012-13 was a poor season for the club with no fewer than 4 managers - Mark Tompkins left the club after just one game; assistant Mick Read stepped in as temporary manager for a month, before the club appointed John Hamsher. Things seemed fine until January, when results took a dip. John decided to step down in early April, with vice-chairman Mick Ford taking over the reins for the final 3 matches.

In 2013-14 Chipstead started the season with a new management team. From August until the end of October 7 games out of 21 were won in all competitions, including losing both F.A. Trophy FA Cup matches within eight days. Geoff Corner stepped aside as Chairman, with Mick Ford taking up the position. Mick's first task was to appoint a new manager in Steve Baker. A mid-table finish of 13th was a great turnaround for the club. Steve left the club in 2014-15, and was replaced by Simon Colbran.

Following a poor start to the 2015/16 season, Simon resigned, and was replaced by Lyncon Buckwell. Unable to turn things around, Lyndon was himself replaced by Craig Tanner, well known to Tooting & Mitcham folk, who, with Adam Moriarty, ultimately managed to save the club from relegation with a few games to spare. Craig & Adam then left the club during the summer.

2016-17 saw the return of ex-Chipstead player Antony Williams to manage the 1st team along with his assistants, two of whom had played for the club in the past. Having former club players in management gave everyone at the club a lift, and they quickly got to work, and comfortably avoided relegation.

The powers that be put the club in the Bostik League South Central Division for 2018/19, Chipstead held their own in the division, although Antony decided to step aside.

Rob Smith lead the club into the 2019/20 season in the newly-named BetVictor Isthmian League South Central Division.

Following 2 curtailed seasons due to the pandemic, the club finished 10th in the 2021/22 season, the equal-highest ever position in the Isthmian League. The Chippers continued to build and strengthen the squad for season 2022/23, but the end of that season saw the departure of the existing management team after 4 years at the helm.

The club was quick to appoint Dean Sammut in his first managerial role for 2023/24, following a brief spell at Burgess Hill in a caretaker role alongside Lewis Taylor. Dean had been a coach for the first team over the previous couple of years.

The squad came together & started the season well, but ultimately got relegated, as Binfield completed a highly- improbable escape.

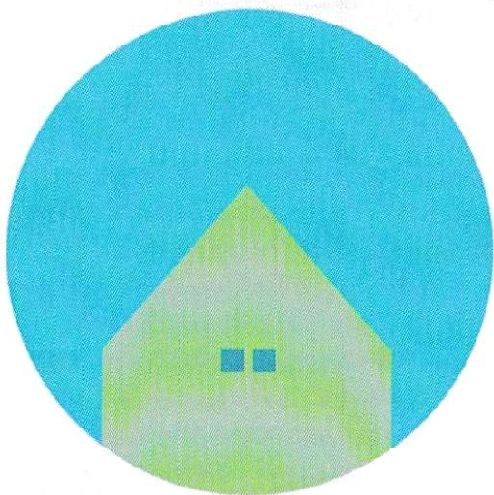
Now in the Combined Combined League Premier Division South, experienced manager Justin Fevrier & his assistants Oliver Saunders + Glen Nichols took over for 2024/25, but they resigned after the 3-0 league defeat at Tooting & Mitcham in October, so Aaron Lamont & Peter Wedgeworth amongst the senior players took care of footballing matters, with Peter now 1st team assistant player/manager, & the returning Daryl Coleman as 1st team player/manager.

Oshane Brown – aged 29 – signed last season from AFC Croydon Athletic, having also played at Sutton Common Rovers - featured in both games over the August Bank Holiday weekend.

Finnley Davenport – aged 18 – Chipstead under-18s' keeper last season, who quickly proved his capability at 1st team level too, consistently showing his shot-stopping prowess at the higher level, but, after another good display in the 2-2 league draw at Sandhurst Town in February, was found to have fractured his thumb, & missed the rest of the season.

Liam Murphy – aged 37 – experienced keeper, who has joined from Allyn Old Boys FC – made his debut in the 5-0 FA Cup defeat at AFC Whyteleafe.

Connor French – aged 32 – experienced striker, who has joined from Bearsted FC during the close season.

Carl Oblitey – aged 30 – signed from Epsom & Ewell in the close season – scored the early goal in the 5-1 league defeat at Horley Town, scored both goals in the 2-2 league draw at Eversley & California, & the opener in the 3-2 home league win over Redhill.

Tyrone Selormey – aged 23 – joined the club recently from Horley Town, having come through the junior ranks at the High Road before university.

Melford Simpson – aged 36 – signed during last season from Corinthian Casuals, formerly with Haywards Heath Town & South Park too – played a few games at Whitehawk for some step 3 action at the end of last season, but, being a firm fan favourite at the club, it's great to see him back.

Enrique Tiamuna – aged 20 – joined during last season from Tavistock AFC – equally adept at wing-back, as he is to playing up front or in midfield.

WE'VE MET BEFORE

Games between Badshot Lea and Chipstead have been few and far between over the years and that's mainly because of today's visitors superior league status compared to The Baggies in the past.

In fact, whilst Badshot have only managed two seasons at Step 4, Chipstead remained in the Isthmian League set up for seventeen campaigns in a row, reaching those dizzy heights after winning the Combined Counties Premier League in 2007 and although never finishing better than tenth, they remained a step 4 club until their relegation during our first attempt in the South-Central at the end of 2023/24.

The three games between the two clubs that term ended in two wins and a draw for Badshot Lea in league and cup, albeit close encounters. Come the end of all fixtures played, Baggy Lea finished in eleventh that year whilst today's opponents dropped into the league we both face ourselves in now after ending up second from bottom, twenty-four points adrift of Badshot Lea.

Badshot Lea manager Gavin Smith was delighted with his side's first-half performance after they beat Chipstead 4-2 at Westfield Lane on Saturday in the Isthmian League South Central Division.

The Baggies took the lead on nine minutes when Adam New swept home from a corner, and Lamin Ceesay tapped home on 37 minutes to make it 2-0 after good trickery from Kai Allsopp.

The visitors got themselves back in the game in the second half and pulled a goal back through Bradley Wilson's header on 61 minutes.

"It doesn't matter how it happens. We're pleased with the first half. The second half we've got to learn from, but that's down to us as a management team making changes with certain things. In terms of what we wanted to do the first half was perfect.

Kai showed a great bit of quality for the second goal. He shows that in abundance in training and he's growing into the side. The lads love him – we want to see him expressing himself and getting on the ball and doing those things."

Saturday's win against Chipstead was Badshot Lea's first home league win of the campaign, and Smith was pleased to achieve that milestone.

"It's nice, because you want to win your home games," said Smith. "Nothing is easy in this league, which is good – and you're going to get tested every game."

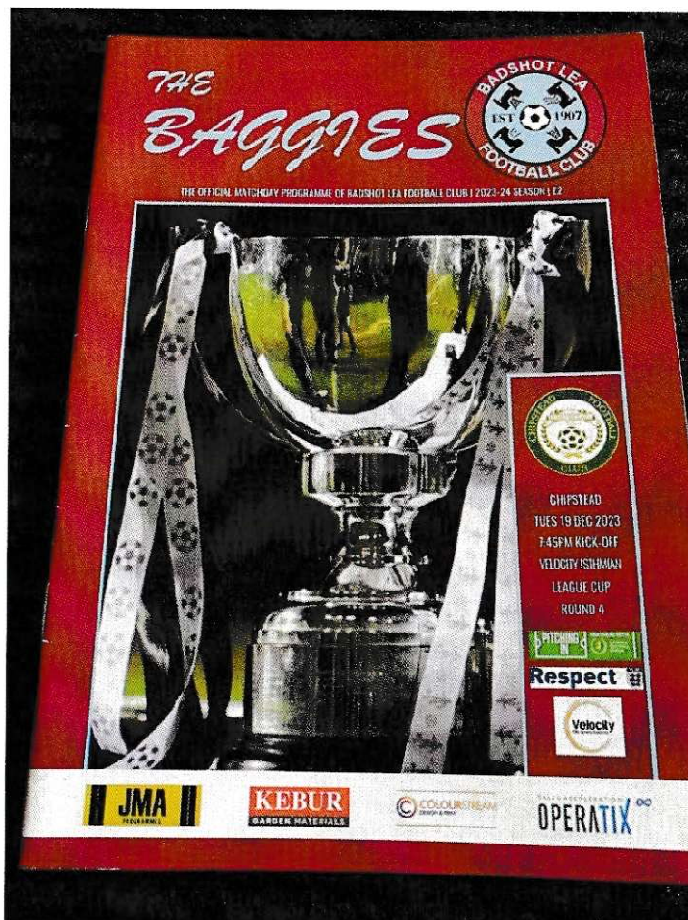

Chipstead will be aggrieved that they didn't reach a second penalty shootout in 24 hours, as Badshot Lea snatched a late winner in added time of their round 4 encounter in the Velocity Cup on Tuesday night.

Both sides managed well, considering the blustery conditions, but the pitch held up, unlike five weeks previously, when the game was postponed late, after everyone had arrived in the car park.

You couldn't fault the effort of the young Chipstead side, who played the first half with the howling wind & rain at their backs, and Jack Leahy went close early on with a shot deflected for a corner.



Jaden Edwards then got away down the right, squaring to Leahy, whose drive was blocked, before the same two combined, with Edwards' deep cross to the far post seeing Leahy scuff his shot, when he had more time than he expected.

The Chips' backline was holding firm, typified by Zohair Ali's fine covering tackle, as a home striker bore down on goal - after a fine Alfie Young block on halfway, Lanseny Traore strode forward, before feeding Leahy, who was denied again.

Young soon got away down the left, before crossing low to Danyaal Iqbal, who couldn't quite get enough on the ball to beat the keeper - Leahy had another drive pushed wide for a corner, & was then inches wide from a 30-yard free-kick, after Traore had been crudely tripped, & it remained scoreless at the break.

After the interval, Jacob Sewell beavered away well up front, before sending Leahy in on goal, his shot bouncing awkwardly in front of the keeper, but it was scrambled clear. Chipstead got their chance on 51 minutes, as Sewell was felled in the box - Leahy's penalty was saved, but Edwards turned home the rebound to give them a 1-0 lead. Yet, as so often happens, the referee gave Badshot a penalty too - as the ball hit a post & was cleared off the line, Keeya went down under no obvious contact, & their sub Luis Hamblin, tucked away the spot-kick to make it 1-1.

The game seemed to be heading for penalties - Harrison Firth comfortably held a deflected shot from distance, while Ali's goal bound header from a Leahy corner was cleared - Chips introduced their subs for fresh legs, including young Reuben Ashun, who had starred for the under-18s on Monday night, but, as the game entered added time, their defence was stretched one last time, & Joshua Keeya, who had earlier earned their dubious penalty, fired home to put Badshot 2-1 up & break Chipstead hearts.

There was still time for Firth to make a fine save to deny a home third goal, but not for his teammates to muster an equaliser, so Badshot Lea go on to host Hashtag Utd. in the quarter-finals, & it was rough justice on the Chipstead lads, who next host Met Police in the league at the weekend.

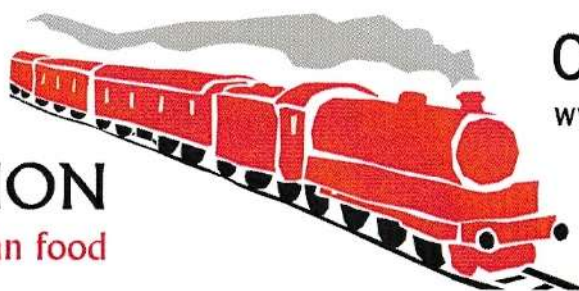
